Show notes - Zonia Sanchez

 Zonia Sánchez, an <u>unlicensed Family, Friend, and Neighbor (FFN) childcare</u> <u>provider</u>, shares her story of 15 years caring for children in California.

- A look at her <u>daily routine</u>, from welcoming children at 6:30 a.m. to guiding preschool readiness through Spanish language, reading, and comprehension activities.
- The joy and pride in celebrating milestones: first words, first steps, learning to eat independently, and toilet training successes.
- How Zonia builds trust and strong bonds with families, keeping parents informed and supporting their goals of education and work.
- A candid discussion of <u>challenges in FFN caregiving</u>: long hours, no personal time, low pay (\$3.65/hour), and lack of benefits despite being essential.
- A reflection on the **true value of childcare work**, comparing the wages of caregivers to fast-food jobs and asking why society undervalues those shaping future leaders.
- The <u>pandemic spotlight</u>: caregivers were called "essential," yet quickly forgotten when the crisis passed.
- Zonia's call for <u>union organizing and recognition</u>, emphasizing that <u>California's</u>
 60,000 FFN <u>providers</u> are vital to the state's economy and deserve dignity, fair wages, and respect.
